How you can help with Resourcefulness.

We understand that you will want to support your children with this learning development and as always we appreciate your continued support. Here are a few ideas:

Encourage your child to be organised - make lists of things to do or things they need help with.



Encourage your child to think up questions.

What? Where? When? How? Why? Who?

Place these on a 'question wall' or maybe the fridge door and then discuss how you are going to find out the answer. For example; use a dictionary to find out the meaning of all unknown words, use books or the internet to find out answers to questions.

Play 20 questions to guess the object.

Odd-one-out - Show a number of objects, photographs or words and ask which is the odd-one-out and why. (Similar to odd-one-out on 'Have I got news for you').

When travelling ask questions e.g. 'What do you think is behind that hill?' 'Who lives in that house?'

If your child needs equipment to help solve mathematical problems encourage using everyday objects e.g. spoons.

RESOURCEFULNESS is about being ready, willing and able to learn in different ways. It's about asking good questions, making links and connections, being curious and making good use of equipment.


At School
